The team championship was won by the Brooklyn Central team, which mounted a well balanced team effort in spite of the absence of Walter Spence, due to an attack of the "Flu." This is the third time in four years that the Brooklyn team won this team championship.

Biography: Walter Laufer was born July 15, 1906 in Cincinnati, Ohio. Walter was discovered by Fred "Tiny" Pfeiffer, the Cincinnati East High coach, and was later coached at the Central Parkway YMCA and the Chicago Lakeshore Athletic Club by Stanley Brauninger. Walter participated in the 1925 and 1926 YMCA National Championships and set a new national record in the 50 Yard Freestyle in 1926. Walter and his YMCA team also won the National AAU Indoor Championship in 1926. Walter (including relays points) outscored all of the other teams. In addition, he was also recognized by the Sports Writers as the 1926 "Swimmer of the Year." In 1928, Walter was a member of the U.S. Olympic Team and won two medals: Silver in the 100 Meter Backstroke and Gold in the 800 Meter Freestyle Relay, which was anchored by Johnny Weissmuller. In 1974, Walter Adam Laufer was inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Walter died on July 16, 1984.
